Presentation

Tablet: 100 mg

Storage

Store at room temperature, below 25°C

Dose

Administration

Take with a large glass of water, and remain upright (do not lie down) for an hour after taking.

Do not take antacids, iron, calcium or zinc supplements within 2 hours of a dose as they may decrease absorption of doxycycline.

Monitoring

Oesophageal ulceration, skin photosensitivity.

Pregnancy

1st Trimester: Consider alternative.

2nd Trimester: Contraindicated.

3rd Trimester: Contraindicated.

Breastfeeding

Considered safe to use for 7 to 10 days duration. Prolonged use is not recommended. Observe the infant for diarrhoea, vomiting, thrush, or skin rashes.

Comments

Avoid sun exposure, wear protective clothing and use sunscreen while taking doxycycline.
